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
APGs - characteristics

- Voluntary, informal
- Known by several names
- Backbench driven
- Two main types




APGs – activities

- Distribute information
- Meet with stakeholders
- Conduct inquiries
- Lobby ministers
- Introduce motions and legislation
- Some policy influence



UK - Growth




Research problem

- Little research in Westminster context
- One extensive American study
- Can US research be transferred?



Congressional caucuses

- Hammond 1998
- Participation driven by goals
- Higher among:
 - Marginal representatives
 - Newer members



Meanwhile in the Commonwealth

- Similar goals
- Very different institutional context
 - More hierarchy in legislature and party
 - Greater geographic focus, especially in Canada
 - More emphasis on executive positions



Research questions

- Is participation in APGs in Canada and the UK shaped by:
 - Margin of victory?
 - Length of service?
- Are these relationships constant between group and position type?

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Methodology

- 11 DVs – membership + executive data
- Added controls:
 - Party and gender
 - Cabinet and Shadow cabinet
 - Number of MPs in a party
 - Number of Groups in operation



Methodology

- Largely panel data
- Interested in differences between panelists and over time
- Random-effects model using GLS
- OLS used for Canadian subject data

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Conclusions

- Cannot directly extrapolate from US
- Similar link between participation and margin of victory in UK
- New members less likely to participate
- Substantial differences between geographic and subject groups
- Also differences by position type



Conclusions

- Women appear to have different engagement in APGs than men
- Smaller, more marginal parties more active in subject groups
- Canadian analysis limited by data
